CHAPTER I

Introduction

The National Tiger Conservation Authority is a statutory body under the Ministry of Environment and Forests, constituted under enabling provisions of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2006, for strengthening tiger conservation, as per powers and functions assigned to it under the said Act.

The National Tiger Conservation Authority has been fulfilling its mandate within the ambit of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 for strengthening tiger conservation in the country by retaining an oversight through advisories/normative guidelines, based on appraisal of tiger status, ongoing conservation initiatives and recommendations of specially constituted Committees. 'Project Tiger' is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme of the Ministry of Environment and Forests, providing funding support to tiger range States, for in-situ conservation of tigers in designated tiger reserves, and has put the endangered tiger on an assured path of recovery by saving it from extinction, as revealed by the recent findings of the All India tiger estimation using the refined methodology.

Objectives of tiger conservation:-

To ensure maintenance of a viable population of Tigers in India for scientific, economic, aesthetic, cultural and ecological values, and to preserve for all times, areas of biological importance as a national heritage for the benefit, education and enjoyment of the people.



CHAPTER II

<u>Constitution of the National Tiger Conservation Authority including changes</u> there in and its functions

The National Tiger Conservation Authority was constituted with effect from 4.09.2006, for strengthening tiger conservation by, interalia, ensuring normative standards in tiger reserve management, preparation of reserve specific tiger conservation plan, laying down annual / audit report before Parliament, constituting State level Steering Committees under the Chairmanship of Chief Ministers and establishment of Tiger Conservation Foundation. Functions of the NTCA:

Powers and functions of the National Tiger Conservation Authority as prescribed under section 380 of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2006 are as under:-

- (a) to approve the tiger conservation plan prepared by the State Government under subsection (3) of section 38V of this Act;
- (b) evaluate and assess various aspects of sustainable ecology and disallow any ecologically unsustainable land use such as, mining, industry and other projects within the tiger reserves;
- (c) lay down normative standards for tourism activities and guidelines for project tiger from time to time for tiger conservation in the buffer and core area of tiger reserves and ensure their due compliance;
- (d) provide for management focus and measures for addressing conflicts of men and wild animal and to emphasize on co-existence in forest areas outside the National Parks, sanctuaries or tiger reserve, in the working plan code;
- (e) provide information on protection measures including future conservation plan, estimation of population of tiger and its natural prey species, status of habitats, disease surveillance, mortality survey, patrolling, reports on untoward happenings and such other management aspects as it may deem fit including future plan conservation;
- (f) approve, co-ordinate research and monitoring on tiger, co-predators, prey habitat, related ecological and socio-economic parameters and their evaluation;
- (g) ensure that the tiger reserves and areas linking one protected area or tiger reserve with another protected area or tiger reserve are not diverted for ecologically unsustainable uses, except in public interest and with the approval of the National Board for Wild Life and on the advice of the Tiger Conservation Authority;
- (h) facilitate and support the tiger reserve management in the State for biodiversity conservation initiatives through eco-development and people's participation as per approved management plans and to support similar initiatives in adjoining areas consistent with the Central and State laws;
- (i) ensure critical support including scientific, information technology and legal support for better implementation of the tiger conservation plan;
- (j) facilitate ongoing capacity building programme for skill development of officers and staff of tiger reserves, and
- (k) perform such other functions as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act with regard to conservation of tigers and their habitat.



CHAPTER III

Meetings of the Tiger Conservation Authority and important decisions taken therein

1. Decisions taken in the first meeting of the National Tiger Conservation Authority held on 28th November, 2006

The first meeting of the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) was held under the Chairmanship of the Minister for Environment and Forests at New Delhi on 28th November, 2006.

The following agenda items were discussed, and the details of decisions taken are as below:

Agenda Item No. 1

Measures to make the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) functional

(a) & (b) Transfer of posts/staff/assets of Project Tiger to the NTCA

Secretary (E&F) stated that pursuant to the proviso under Section 38N (1) of the Wildlife (Protection) Act 2006, which has already come into force with effect from 4th September, 2006, all officers and employees holding office under the Directorate of Project Tiger and dealing with Project Tiger immediately before the date of constitution of the Tiger Conservation Authority are continuing in the National Tiger Conservation Authority. The members of the Authority are being apprised of the same for information.

Decision: NTCA was apprised of agenda items 1 (a) & (b).

(c),(d)&(e) Declaring the Member Secretary (NTCA) as "Head of Department" of the Authority, constitution of a Committee for structuring the rules/guidelines relating to delegation of administrative and financial powers to the Member Secretary, National Tiger Conservation Authority, constitution of Administrative and Financial Committees of the NTCA

Decision: Deferred till the next meeting of the NTCA.

Agenda Item No. 2

Approval of grants for the current financial year and approach paper for the XIth Five Year Plan (a) & (b) Grants for the current financial year and continuation of the process till the next financial year

Decision: the existing process of fund release would continue till March, 2007 and the operational guidelines would be finalized soon.

(d) & (e) Creation of a separate budget head for the NTCA and releasing central assistance directly to the Tiger Conservation Foundation to be established in tiger reserves as per the provisions of the Wildlife (Protection) Amendment Act, 2006

Decision: Deferred till the next meeting of the NTCA.

(f) Approach paper for the XIth Five Year Plan

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Decision: The views of the members were taken into consideration towards finalizing the plan proposal of NTCA for onward transmission to the Working Group constituted by the Planning Commission for the purpose.

Agenda item No. 3

Implementation of Tiger Task Force recommendations

(a) Formation of State Level Steering Committee

Decision: The Chairman made it clear that since the law requires constitution of the State Level Steering Committees under the Chief Ministers to ensure the necessary political will for tiger conservation, they need to be constituted at the earliest.

(b) Independent assessment of tiger reserves

Decision: Formation of a Committee under the Chairmanship of Prof. Madhav Gadgil with expert members for refining the monitoring parameters and suggesting related improvement relating to creation of wikipedia in the public domain.

(c) Develop network with researchers for fostering field research

Decision: A Committee was constituted to suggest refinement for monitoring, its dissemination in the public domain and networking amongst researchers with the following composition:

(d),(e),(f),(h) Evolving detailed, site-specific protection strategy and evaluation of plans for their improvement

Discussion on specific strategy in insurgency and naxalite areas

Appraisal of field vacancies in each reserve

Preparing specific programme targeted to hunting tribes in each reserve

Decision: (i) The local workforce comprising of local people should be deployed for protection. In view of the paucity of frontline staff in many tiger reserves, State should launch a special recruitment drive for filling up frontline field staff vacancies. Preference should be given to local forest dwelling people, by if necessary, relaxing the prescribed qualifications for such posts. The process needs to be completed within a time frame of six months from the start of the coming financial year (2007-08).

Agenda Item No. 7

Implementation of the Wildlife (Protection) Amendment Act, 2006 by Tiger States. The Authority took note of the following statutory requirements on which compliance is required from tiger range States for implementing the Wildlife Amendment Act, 2006:



- (i) Constitution of Steering Committee as required under section 38U of the said Act.
- (ii) Preparation of Tiger Conservation Plan as required under section 38V of the said Act.
- (iii) Establishment of Tiger Conservation Foundation as required under section 38X of the said Act.

Decision:

- 1. The Authority did not prescribe a time frame at this stage for compliance of the above provisions by States. However, it was decided that directives should be sent to the States in this regard for early compliance.
- 2. The Authority approved in principle, preparation of a draft Memorandum of Understanding between NTCA and States for reinforcing tiger conservation measures in the country, which would be discussed in its next meeting.

(vi) Procurement of field vehicle

The NTCA approved the proposal for procurement of a four wheel diesel driven vehicle for the NTCA.

(vii) MOU with NGOs for capacity building, tiger estimation

The NTCA took note of the same and approved collaboration with NGOs through MOU involving financial implications from the NTCA, which would be duly processed by its Technical Committee before approval.

(viii) Monitoring of village relocation activities by the Technical Committee of NTCA

The NTCA approved monitoring of village relocation activities by the Technical Committee of the NTCA.

(ix) Independent assessment of tiger reserves using parameters modified / suggested by the NTCACommittee

The NTCA approved the above. The monitoring process would take into account the recommendations made by the Committee constituted under the Chairmanship of Prof. Gadgil.

(x) Timing of next All India Tiger Estimation using the new methodology and advanced capacity building

The NTCA approved the proposal for carrying out the next All India Tiger Estimation using the refined methodology during the year 2009-10, for which capacity building would be initiated from 2008.

(xi) Capacity building for using new monitoring protocol for day-to-day monitoring of tiger and wild animals

The NTCA approved the proposal for organizing capacity building workshops/field training of field staff of tiger reserves, in collaboration with the Wildlife Institute of India and other non-governmental agencies/researchers, for using the new data collection protocol used in the refined All India Tiger Estimation for day-to-day monitoring.

Agenda Item No. 8

The NTCA took note of the following:

- (i) New posts approved for the Authority.
- (ii) Logo for NTCA

The Members did not approve the proposed Logo. After deliberations there was a consensus on a 2^{nd} option suggested by the Secretary (E&F).



- (iii) Compliance issues (creation of Tiger Conservation Foundation, preparation of Tiger Conservation Plan, constitution of Steering Committees, receipt of Indicative Plans and MOU).
- (iv) Proposals relating to reintroduction of tiger:
- (a) Progress on tiger reintroduction in Sariska as approved by the NTCA Technical Committee with central assistance, based on the recovery plan of WII.

(b) Introduction of tigress in Panna, considering the skewed sex ratio.

(c) Need for a detailed proposal from the State (with designated core and buffer areas) for tiger reintroduction in the Madhav National Park, Shivpuri.

(d) Continuing observations on orphaned tiger cubs in the in-situ enclosure at Kanha, as suggested by the NTCA Technical Committee.

Shri V.P. Singh highlighted the success achieved in rehabilitating the Mongia Tribes in the Ranthambhore Tiger Reserve landscape (Rajasthan), and the need for duplicating such efforts.

The main functions / objectives of the Administrative Committee would be:

The main functions / objectives of the Technical Committee would be:

- (i) to approve proposals for release of financial assistance to various tiger reserves.
- (ii) to approve proposals for research, training, workshops and meetings of NTCA.
- (iii) to approve proposals for constituting monitoring committees and framing of parameters for monitoring.
- (iv) to review, oversee and implement all India estimation of tiger, copredators and prey animals, apart from monitoring habitat status.
- (v) any other function that may be assigned to it by the NTCA.

Meeting of the Technical Committee was held under the Chairmanship of Shri M.B. Lal, Addl. DGF (WL) on 16th May, 2008.

Agenda Item No. 1

Proposals from Wildlife Institute of India for Phase IV monitoring of source population of tigers.

The Committee deliberated on the proposals and considering the urgent need to study the source-sink dynamics of tiger reserves.

Agenda Item No. 2

Proposal on 'development of pugmark software' and 'landscape genetics of tigers and other large carnivores in various landscapes'.

The Committee accorded 'in-principle' approval on the pugmark software proposal with the observation that the same should be sent to several field experts and the WII for comments at the outset.

Agenda Item No. 3

Proposal from M/s Natraj Publishers for financial support towards cost of printing 14 "Wildlife Classics" books.



The Committee discussed the proposal and recommended a one time grant of Rs. 5 lakhs, with a condition that the Classics should be selected by the Technical Committee of the NTCA.

Agenda Item No. 4

Proposal from 'NEERA' Mahila Samiti, Uttarakhand for 'Tiger Conservation Enhancement in Kumaon'.

The Committee discussed the proposal and approved the amount with the condition that a detailed, time bound work plan should be submitted by the NGO for carrying out awareness workshops and related programmes in the schools falling in the identified villages of the Corbett landscape.

Agenda Item No. 5

Research proposal from WINROCK International, India

The Committee deliberated on the proposal.

Agenda Item No. 6

Proposal from WTI, New Delhi for 'training and equipping of frontline forest staff in Tiger Reserves'.

The Committee discussed the proposal and decided that the proponents should be asked at this stage to submit a detailed, tiger reserve specific proposal.

Agenda Item No. 7

Proposal from States for funding support to tiger reserves through Annual Plan of Operations.

The Committee discussed only the proposals received from States for funding support under the CSS of Project Tiger towards village relocation involving the enhanced package.

Agenda Item No. 8

Proposal from Registrar, North Orissa University, Baripada, Orissa for establishing centre for Similipal studies.

The Committee did not recommend the proposal since it was beyond the scope of the NTCA.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.



CHAPTER V

Monitoring and Evaluation

The National Tiger Conservation Authority in association with the Wildlife Institute of India carried out the first All India Tiger Estimation report with refined scientific methodology as recommended by the Tiger Task Force, in 2008.

This report evaluates the current status of tigers, co-predators and their prey in India. It is the outcome of a country-wide effort to scientifically determine the occupancy, population limits, habitat condition and connectivity, so as to guide conservation planning for ensuring the survival of free ranging tigers. The study shifts the focus from tiger number and protected area oriented conservation practices to landscape level holistic conservation strategies.

A three phase approach was used to sample all forested habitats in tiger states. A double sampling approach was used to first estimate occupancy and relative abundance of tigers, copredators, and prey through sign and encounter rates in all forested areas. A team of researchers then sampled a subset of these areas using robust statistical approaches like mark-recapture and distance sampling to estimate absolute densities of tigers and their prey. Covariate information was generated using remotely sensed data and attribute data using Geographic Information System. Indices (tiger signs, prey relative abundance indices, habitat characteristics) were then calibrated against absolute densities and the relationships used for extrapolation of tiger densities within a landscape. Tiger numbers were obtained for contiguous patches of occupied forests by using average densities for that population block. Numbers and densities are reported as adult tigers with a standard error range.

Tiger occupied forests in India have been classified into 6 landscape complexes; namely (a) Shivalik-Gangetic Plains, (b) Central Indian Landscape Complex (c) Eastern Ghats, (d) Western Ghats, (e) North-Eastern Hills and Bhramaputra Plains, and (f) Sunderbans. Tiger populations within these landscape complexes are likely to share a common gene pool, since tiger habitats within these landscape complexes were contiguous during the recent past. Each landscape complex consists of landscape units that still have contiguous tiger habitat and contain one to many breeding populations of tigers (source populations). Within each landscape unit there exists a potential to manage some of the tiger populations as a meta-populations. This enhances the conservation potential of each of the single populations and probability of their long-term persistence.

Occupancy of a forest patch by tigers was negatively correlated with human disturbance indices and positively correlated with prey availability, forest patch and core sizes. For establishing and maintaining high density source populations of tigers it is essential to set aside inviolate areas devoid of human presence within each landscape. These source populations should be connected through multiple use forests (buffers and corridors) where human land uses conducive to maintaining low density tiger occupancy are permitted and fostered by providing appropriate incentives to local communities.

The Shivalik-Gangetic plain landscape complex is composed of two landscape units; (a) Kalesar to Kishenpur and (b) Dudhwa to Valmiki. The landscape complex had about 20,800 km2 of potential tiger habitat on the Indian side. The Dudhwa-Valmiki landscape is now connected only via Nepal forests, and needs to be managed through International cooperation with Nepal. Currently the tiger occupies 5080 km2 of forested habitats with an estimated population size of 297 (259 to 335) in six separate populations. The most important tiger population within this landscape is



Corbett having tiger presence in 1,524 km2 with an estimated population of 164 (151-178). The landscape is characterized by having the ability of sustaining high density tiger populations e.g. Corbett 19.6 tigers per 100 km2, Dudhwa, Kishenpur and Katarniaghat tiger density ranging between 4.5 to 6.5 tigers per 100 km2. Thus, with good management and protection tiger reserves in this landscape can serve an important role for tiger conservation. Reserves and landscapes that need fostering to achieve their inherent potential are Rajaji (along with Shivalik, and Haridwar Forest Divisions) and Valmiki Tiger Reserve.

Within the forest area of the Central Indian Landscape tiger presence is currently reported from 47,122 km2 (11.6 % of forests) with an estimated tiger population of 451 (347 to 564) distributed in 17 populations. The Central Indian landscape complex consists of eleven separate landscapes out of which four have potential to sustain meta-populations of tigers. These are (a) Kanha-Pench landscape of about 16,000 km2 with tiger occupancy of 3880 km2 with an estimated population of 121 tigers (b) Satpura-Melghat landscape of 12,700 km2 with a tiger occupancy in 3331 km2 and a population estimate of 69 tigers (c) Sanjay-Palamau landscape of 13,700km2 and (d) Navegaon-Indravati landscape of 34,000 km2. Five other landscapes with single source populations which could potentially persist due to their reasonable large size and potential for high density tiger population are (a) Bandhavgarh with tiger occupancy in 1575 km2 and a population estimate of 47 tigers (b) Panna with tiger occupancy in 974 km2 and a population estimate of 24 tigers (c) Ranthambhore-Kuno-Palpur with tiger occupancy in 3506 km2 and a population estimate of 36 tigers (d) Tadoba with tiger occupancy in 775 km2 and a population estimate of 34 tigers (e) Similipal with tiger occupancy in 2297 km2 and a population estimate of 20 tigers. Areas that need major inputs for achieving their conservation objectives and potential are Similipal landscape, Palamau – Sanjay landscape, and Indravati landscape (which could not be assessed due to insurgency). The above landscapes are large, contiguous forest patches with legal conservation status and therefore can potentially sustain viable tiger populations. Large part of area with low sign intensity in Western Maharashtra was not used for analysis due to non mapable information.

The Eastern Ghat landscape complex currently has about 15,000 km2 of potential tiger habitat. Tigers occupy 7,772 km2 of forested habitats with an estimated population size of 53 (49 to 57) in a single contiguous forest block constituted by the Srisailam-Nagarjuna Sagar Tiger Reserve and adjoining forests in the districts of Kurnool, Parakasam, Chuddapah, Mahbubnagar and Guntur. This landscape is capable of supporting higher densities of tigers than currently reported. Major problems in achieving this potential is insurgency, biotic pressures, and subsistence level poaching of tiger prey.

Currently Tigers occupy 21,435 km2 of forests within the Western Ghat Landscape comprising 21% of the forested area. The current potential tiger habitat in the landscape complex is about 51,000 km2. The population estimate for this landscape was 366 (297-434) tigers. The Western Ghat landscape complex consists of three landscape units; (a) Forested area from the district of Pune to Palghat in Kerala, and eastwards upto Dharmapuri in Tamil Nadu. This landscape has good potential for long term tiger survival due to its large extent of over 34,000 km2 of contiguous forest, with several source populations of tigers that likely exist as a meta-population (b) Forest areas South of Palghat upto Kodaikanal having some connectivity with the Periyar landscape (c) the Periyar-Kalakad landscape unit of about 10,000 km2 area. The single largest population of tigers in India is within this landscape comprising the landscape of Nagarhole-Madumalai-Bandipur-Waynad encompassing the states of Karnataka, Tamil-Nadu and Kerala having a tiger occupancy in 10,800 km2 and an estimated tiger population of about 280 tigers.




This population serves as a fine example of managing inter-state tiger reserves for establishing populations that have a good chance of long term persistence as well as provides a source to repopulate neighbouring forests.


North-Eastern hills and Bhramaputra plains currently reported tiger occupancy in 4230 km2 of forests. This landscape was sampled in an expedition mode based on supervised knowledge and not as per the Phase I protocol, thus this occupancy is likely to be an under estimate. North East Hills and Brahmaputra Flood Plains Landscape is also composed of two landscape units; (a) The largest single landscape unit of about 136,000 km2 extending from Pakke Tiger Reserve to Namdapha Tiger Reserve in the East, and towards Dampa Tiger Reserve in the South. Kaziranga constituting a major source population of tigers, is connected through the Karbi Anglong hills. The landscape continues West upto Balphakram National Park, (b) The second landscape complex consists of Manas Tiger Reserve, in Assam, along with Buxa Tiger Reserve, Gorumara and Singhalila forests of West Bengal. The landscape is fragmented on the Indian side but has forest contiguity through Bhutan, and currently has about 7,200 km2 of good tiger habitat. The single most important tiger population in this landscape was that of Kaziranga that formed a part of a forest patch of 136,000 km2, tiger occupancy of Kaziranga was only 766 km2 but due to its potential for sustaining a high density population and forest contiguity through the Karbi Anglong hills it serves as a major source for dispersing tigers.

The Sunderbans landscape complex is the smallest isolated landscape that likely has a single population of tigers with a tiger occupancy in 1586 km2. Population number assessment for Sunderbans is ongoing as a separate exercise as the uniqueness of the habitat requires a different approach such as using radio-telemetry for estimating tiger numbers. The Sunderbans tiger population needs to be managed through International cooperation with the Government of Bangladesh.

State wise summery of tiger occupancy and estimated population is provided in table ES.1.

The above assessment has shown that though the tiger has lost much ground due to direct poaching, loss of quality habitat, and loss of its prey, there is still hope. Individual tiger populations that have high probability of long term persistence by themselves are only a few: Nagarhole-Madumalai-Bandipur-Waynad population, Corbett population, Kanha population, and possibly Sunderban and Kaziranga-Karbi Anglong populations. Tiger populations that exist and can persist in a meta population framework are Rajaji-Corbett, Dudhva-Katarniaghat-Kishenpur (along with Bardia and Shuklaphanta in Nepal), Satpura-Melghat, Pench-Kanha, Bhadra-Kudremukh, Parambikulum-Indira Gandhi, and KMTR-Preiyar. The landscapes that have potential but are currently in need of conservation inputs are Srisailam Nagarjun Sagar, Simlipal, Ranthambhore-Kuno Palpur, Indravati-Northern Andhra Pradesh, and Bandhavgarh-Sanjay-Palamau. To ensure the long term survival of tigers in India it is imperative to offer strict protection to established source populations and manage areas with restorative inputs by involving local communities in buffer and corridor areas by providing them with a direct stake in conservation. Tigers are a conservation dependent species requiring large contiguous forests with fair interspersion of undisturbed breeding areas. This leaves little choice other than to evolve strategies by mainstreaming conservation priorities in regional development policy and planning for managing priority areas identified in the landscape complexes. Such an approach would ensure that breeding tiger populations have a possibility to share genetic material and exist in a meta-population framework, thereby enhancing the possibility of their survival.

The milestone initiatives taken by the National Tiger Conservation Authority to protect tiger and other wild animals

Administrative steps

- 1. Strengthening of antipoaching activities, including special strategy for monsoon patrolling, by providing funding support to Tiger Reserve States, as proposed by them, for deployment of antipoaching squads involving ex-army personnel / home guards, apart from workforce comprising of local people, in addition to strengthening of communication / wireless facilities.
- 2. 100% Central Assistance provided to 17 Tiger Reserves as an additionality for deployment of Tiger Protection Force, comprising of ex-army personnel and local workforce.
- 3. Constitution of the National Tiger Conservation Authority with effect from 4.09.2006, for strengthening tiger conservation by, interalia, ensuring normative standards in tiger reserve management, preparation of reserve specific tiger conservation plan, laying down annual / audit report before Parliament, constituting State Level Steering Committees under the Chairmanship of Chief Ministers and establishment of Tiger Conservation Foundation.
- 4. Constitution of a multidisciplinary Tiger and Other Endangered Species Crime Control Bureau (Wildlife Crime Control Bureau) with effect from 6.6.2007 comprising of officers from Police, Forest, Customs and other enforcement agencies to effectively control illegal trade in wildlife.
- 5. Approval accorded for declaring eight new Tiger Reserves.
- 6. The revised Project Tiger guidelines have been issued to States for strengthening tiger conservation, which apart from ongoing activities, interalia, include funding support to States for enhanced village relocation/rehabilitation package for people living in core or critical tiger habitats (from Rs. 1 lakh/family to Rs. 10 lakhs/family), rehabilitation/resettlement of communities involved in traditional hunting, mainstreaming livelihood and wildlife concerns in forests outside tiger reserves and fostering corridor conservation through restorative strategy to arrest habitat fragmentation.
- 7. A scientific methodology for estimating tiger (including copredators, prey animals and assessment of habitat status) has been evolved and mainstreamed. The findings of this estimation/assessment are bench marks for future tiger conservation strategy.
- 8. An area of 26749.097 sq. km. has been notified by 14 Tiger States (out of 17) as **core or critical tiger habitat** under section 38V of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2006 (AP, Arunachal, Assam, Karnataka, Kerala, Jharkhand, MP, Maharashtra, Mizoram, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Uttarakhand, Orissa and West Bengal). Three tiger States (Bihar, Chhattisgarh and UP) have taken a decision for notifying the core or critical tiger habitats (4264.282 sq.km.). The State of Madhya Pradesh has not identified / notified



- the core /critical tiger habitat in its newly constituted tiger reserve (Sanjay National Park and Sanjay Dubri Wildlife Sanctuary).
- 9. Memorandum of Understanding developed for better/concerted implementation of conservation inputs through tiger reserve states.

Financial steps

Financial and technical help is provided to the States under various Centrally Sponsored Schemes, viz. Project Tiger and Integrated Development of Wildlife habitats for enhancing the capacity and infrastructure of the States for providing effective protection to wild animals.

International Cooperation

- 11. India has a Memorandum of Understanding with Nepal on controlling trans-boundary illegal trade in wildlife and conservation, apart from a protocol on tiger conservation with China.
- 12. A Global Tiger Forum of Tiger Range Countries has been created for addressing international issues related to tiger conservation.
- 13. During the 14th meeting of the Conference of parties to CITES, which was held from 3rd to 15th June, 2007 at The Hague, India introduced a resolution along with China, Nepal and the Russian Federation, with directions to parties with operations breeding tigers on a commercial scale, for restricting such captive populations to a level supportive only to conserving wild tigers. The resolution was adopted as a decision with minor amendments. Further, India made an intervention appealing to China to phase out tiger farming, and eliminate stockpiles of Asian big cats body parts and derivatives. The importance of continuing the ban on trade of body parts of tigers was emphasized.

Reintroduction of Tigers in Sariska Tiger Reserve

14. A male tiger and a tigress have been reintroduced in the Sariska Tiger Reserve (Rajasthan), based on a recovery strategy suggested by the Wildlife Institute of India. The tigers are being closely monitored by radio telemetry.

Creation of Special Tiger Protection Force (STPF)

15. The policy initiatives announced by the Finance Minister in his Budget Speech of 29.2.2008, interalia, contains action points relating to tiger protection. Based on the one time grant of Rs. 50.00 crore provided to the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) for raising, arming and deploying a Special Tiger Protection Force, the proposal for the said force has been approved by the competent authority for 13 tiger reserves. Advisory has been sent to Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan and Uttarakhand for initiating steps for deploying in Dudhwa, Ranthambhore and Corbett tiger reserves, with 100% Central assistance during the current financial year.

CHAPTER VIII

Annual Plan of the Tiger Conservation Authority

- 1. Based on the Tiger Task Force recommendations constituted by the National Board for Wildlife chaired by the Prime Minister, the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 has been amended in 2006, to provide a separate chapter (Chapter IVB) for constituting the National Tiger Conservation Authority. The said Authority has been constituted with effect from 4th September, 2006.
- 2. The functions of NTCA are provided under section 38O of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2006. The NTCA would address the ecological as well as administrative concerns for conserving tigers, by providing a statutory basis for protection of tiger reserves, apart from providing strengthened institutional mechanisms for the protection of ecologically sensitive areas and endangered species. The Authority would also ensure enforcing of guidelines for tiger conservation and monitoring compliance of the same, apart from placement of motivated and trained officers having good track record as Field Directors of tiger reserves. It would also facilitate capacity building of officers and staff posted in tiger reserves, apart from a time bound staff development plan.
- 3. During the financial year 2008-09, an amount of Rs. 40 lakhs has been provided to the NTCA as Grants-in-aid. The projected expenditure for the year 2008-09 is as below:

- 5. The above officers and staff are working in the NTCA with the same pay and other emoluments.
- 6. Section 38Q of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2006, provides for constitution of a fund for the NTCA, to be called as the Tiger Conservation Authority Fund, for crediting grants / loans etc.
- 7. Section 63(giv) and (gv) provide for rule relating to Annual Statement of Accounts of the NTCA as well as submission of its Annual Report under Sections 38R and 38S of the said Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, respectively.
- 8. Proposals relating to contractual services / professional service with funding support from NTCA are approved by the Technical Committee of the NTCA. Director (IFD) is a member of the said Technical Committee. In case due to unavoidable circumstance, if the IFD is not represented in the meeting of the Technical Committee of the NTCA, the proposals would be approved on the basis of majority decision, and the IFD would be apprised of the outcome through the minutes of the meeting of the said Committee.

- 10. In view of above, during the financial year, the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) received initially Rs. 40.00 lakhs as Grants-in-aid and subsequently under RE Rs. 187.00 lakhs to meet above liabilities. Thus total grant received by NTCA amounts to Rs. 227 lakhs.
- 11. Accounts of the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) for the year 2008-09 have been compiled. The internal audit has been conducted by the Accounts Officer (IAW), office of the Controller of Accounts, MoEF, Internal Audit Wing, Ministry of Environment and Forests, New Delhi. The final audit of the accounts of the NTCA is conducted by the Principal Director of Audit, Scientific Department of CAG under Section 19(2) of C&AGs (Duties, powers and conditions of Service) Act, 1972 read with Section 38 E (5) & (6) of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972. CHAPTER IX

Compliance Issues

1. Tiger Conservation Plans

Indicative Tiger Conservation Plans prepared by all 38 Tiger Reserves.

2. Steering Committee:

So far, the States of Mizoram, Tamil Nadu, Arunachal Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh and Assam have constituted the State Level Steering Committees as required under section 38U of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972. The other States have been reminded for expediting the same.

3. Tiger Conservation Foundation:

The States of Mizoram, Arunachal Pradesh and Karnataka have created the said Foundation as required under section 38X of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972. The other States have been reminded for expediting the same.

4. Core and Buffer notification:

An area of 31111 sq. km. has been identified/notified in 35 Tiger Reserves by the 17 Tiger States as "core" or "critical tiger habitat", as per section 38V of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2006. The core/critical tiger habitats have been identified by the States as per statutory provisions under section 38V of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 as amended in 2006, on the basis of scientific and objective criteria in consultation with an expert Committee. Establishing such identified areas as "inviolate" for tiger conservation would involve an elaborate participatory statutory process, as contained in the said section.

The Income & Expenditure Accounts and the Receipts & payment Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties Powers & Conditions of Service) Act. 1971 read with Section 38R of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 as amended in 2006. These financial statements are the resposibility of the NTCA's mangement. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standard's and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported though Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material mis-statements. An audit includes examing, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
 - (i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
 - (ii) The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by the Ministry of Finance.
 - (iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the NTCA as requied under Section 38R of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 as amended, in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
 - (iv) We further report that:



A. Revision of Accounts

The NTCA has revised the annual accounts as per the observations of audit. The revision of accounts by NTCA has resulted in assets and liabilities being increased to the extent of Rs. 5,27,332/- in the revised Balance Sheet and excess of income over expenditure being increased to the extent of Rs. 86,21,922/- in the revised Income and Expenditure A/c.

B. Grants in aid

Out of the grants in aid of Rs. 2.27 crore received during the year (out of which Rs 1.87 crore were received on 31.3.09), the NTCA utilized a sum of Rs. 2.27 crore as on 31st March 2009.

C. Management letter: Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Member Secretary, NTCA through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

(v) Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Accounts dealt with by this report are in

agreement with the books of accounts.

- (i) Adequacy of Internal Audit System: Intenal audit of the NTCA has been conducted since inception by the Internal Audit Wing, Controller of Accounts, Ministry of Environment and Forests.
- (ii) Adequacy of Internal Control System: There is ample scope of improvement in the internal control system of the NTCA as the following deficiencies were noticed:
- (1) The Expenditure Control Register to ensure that the expenditure under various heads remained within budget allocations was not maintained.
- (2) Physical verification of consumable and non-consumable items was not conducted. The NTCA stated that the physical verification had been carried out but it could not show the physical verification report and certificate of physical verification in the stock registers.
- (3) Accession Register/Issue Register of library books was not maintained.
- (4) Log book/History sheet/Repair and Maintenance Register/Dismantled Parts Register of vehicle were not being maintained.
- (5) Register of advances was not being maintained.
- (6) Stock items were being purchased and issued without requisition/demand application
- (iii) System of Physical Verification of Assets: The physical verification of assets had not been carried out for the year 2008-09.
